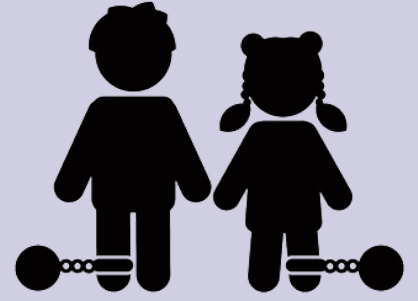


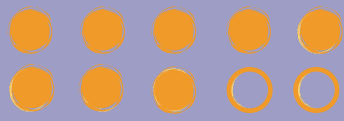

CHILD LABOUR

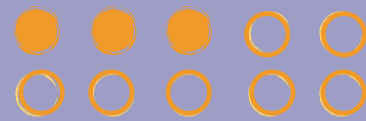
Child Labour refers to the exploitation of children through any form of work that deprives children of their childhood, interferes with their ability to attend regular school, and is mentally, physically, socially, and morally harmful. It includes child abuse, exploitation, bodily harm, child marriage, and use of child soldiers.



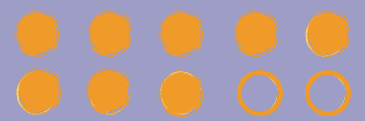
BY NUMBERS



INDIA: 80% of children working in the brick-kilns have nine-hour workdays, everyday.



NEPAL: Almost 23% of children aged 5-12 are involved in child labor



INDIA: 77% of workers do not have access to primary education for their children.

ASKS

The Governments can greatly support the mission to eliminate child labour. We ask them to make and implement strict rules to punish people who employ children. The Right to Education should be better implemented and financial aid should be available to support the higher education of poor children. Governments should ensure schools openly accept and cater to inter-state migrant children who may speak a different language. Residential hostels, transport, and *anganwadis* should be more accessible to children of labourers.

THE STORY OF SOMA DOLUI

Soma Dolui, aged 14, passes her *Madhyamik* Examination this year. When she was only 8, her father abandoned Soma and her mother Gouri. Our teachers identified Soma during a survey in the locality. This year, Soma appeared CLASS X BOARD from her school and passed out obtaining good marks in the Board examination.
