Title: Decent work for all: Ending vulnerability through education and economic empowerment

The Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary-Loreto Generalate (IBVM/CJ NGO) and Red Dot Foundation (RDF) work in 43 countries in partnership with local groups and communities to promote a more sustainable development and human rights centered working conditions for all at international and local levels. As civil society organizations with ECOSOC status at the UN, we are at the forefront in creating an inclusive society and working towards a holistic development for all, especially the marginalized sections of the society. Our members have collaborated with local organizations, national governments and other stakeholders to offer quality education, livelihood training for youth and women from marginalized sections of society to support them in creating jobs and livelihoods for themselves.

This side event will highlight the engagement of civil society organizations with local communities, youth and women's groups in providing quality education, economic empowerment through various micro-financing activities, and skill development programmes. When young women and men have access to decent and productive work, they are able to lift themselves from poverty and reduce their vulnerabilities to child labour, human trafficking, and other forms of exploitation.

Education, upskilling and re-skilling – especially to keep pace with rapid technological and digital transformations affecting jobs — are critical for women's and girl's health and wellbeing, their income-generation opportunities and participation in the formal labor market. Gender inequalities in employment and job quality result in gaps in access to social protection, such as pensions, unemployment benefits or maternity protection. Without access to these benefits, they could end below the poverty line, increasing their vulnerability to all forms of labor exploitation.

Successful engagement of young people in the labor market and society is crucial not only for their own personal economic prospects and well-being, but also for overall economic growth and social cohesion. Through adequate skills, employment, social and broader policy settings, young people have the opportunity to fulfill their potential and maintain confidence in their future prospects.
